



LHS MEMBER RESEARCHING ETHNIC COMMUNITIES OF SCRANTON

Mike DeVivo, a historical geographer on the faculty at Kutztown University and LHS member, is currently engaging in research devoted to Scranton's ethnic communities, with special reference to Italian immigrants and their descendants between 1900 and 1950. Because part of his research involves compiling information derived from oral history interviews, Mr. DeVivo is seeking individuals who are interested in sharing their personal experiences concerning lifeways of immigrants and their children. Ideal candidates would be those of Italian descent who immigrated to Scranton before 1924 or the children of such immigrants. Additionally he is looking for individuals of Polish and Irish descent who also would be willing to be interviewed; these candidates should be either the children or grandchildren of such immigrants who arrived in Scranton between 1880 and 1920.
