NEW COLLECTIONS POLICY

During the September business meeting, the Board of Trustees approved the Society's first Collections Management Policy (CMP). A CMP is a standard policy document which guides aguisition of historical artifacts and archives for historical societies and museums. What follows is a summary of the lengthy statement.

Our CMP focuses on the enhancement of the collections through objects and archives related to Lackawanna County and the use of these items to support bibliographic research, interpretation, and education. A fiduciary responsibility is formed when an appropriate item is accepted. Good preservation management is a hallmark of a well-run historical society.

Deaccessioning of items is always a hot button topic which makes the Collections Management Policy extremely important as the Society begins implementation. All objects and archives, received in the past or to be received in the future, must support the Society's mission of documenting and interpreting county history.

Outgoing loans for purposes consistent with the objectives of the Society may be undertaken. Loans are not made for commercial purposes, nor are they made for entertainment. Likewise, incoming loans may be received for exhibition, research, special events, and other purposes that support the Society's objectives. In general, all loans will not exceed six months but may be renewable. However, provision has been made for long term loans, but not "permanent loans."

All portions of the collection are available for interpretive programs, research, or other interpretive media. Use of the collection is governed by the conservation of each object and preservation of the collection as a whole.

The CMP also requires maintaining a system of collecting and controlling conveyance documents and associated data.

The staff and Collections Committee are now implementing the much needed Collections Management Policy.

STATEMENT OF MISSION AND PURPOSE

--Approved by the LHS Board of Directors May 13, 1998 The Mission Statement of the Lackawanna Historical Society is to collect, preserve, and interpret the artifacts, archives, and bibliographic materials of the social, cultural, and economic history of Northeastern Pennsylvania and particularly Lackawanna County. To further its mission, the Society's specific responsibilities include the following:

- · to foster the knowledge and appreciation of the history and culture of Lackawanna County and associated areas through educational programs. public accessibility to library materials and the artifact/archive collection, and alliances with like-minded organizations.
- to encourage an appreciation of the wider history and culture of the United States by relating the regional experience to that of the nation through programs and activities.

A collection of pamphlets published by the Lackawanna Historical Society.

By-Laws of the Lackawanna Institute of History and Science (organized February 1886, reorganized 1914) published by the Society in 1916. -- The Lackawanna Historical Society was founded in 1886 as the Lackawanna Institute of History and Science. These by-laws illustrate the formation of the Society and give an account of its early years.

Dr. B.H. Throop's Historical Notes (reprinted from the Saturday Argus for the Lackawanna Institute of History and Science 1887) -- Reviews the early history of Scranton and Lackawanna Valley with personal recollections of Dr. Throop.

Poets and Poetry of the Wyoming Valley by Will S. Monroe (reprinted from the Saturday Argus for the Benefit of the Lackawanna Institute of History and Science, March 1887) -- Contains brief survey of the history of Wyoming Valley Poetry.

The Biography and Ancestry of Hon. George Henry Catlin with notes on Genealogy by S. Fletcher Weyburn 1930 -- Gives an account of the life of the Lackawanna Historical Society's benefactor, George H. Catlin.

Lackawanna Historical Society of Scranton, Pennsylvania A Connecticut Town and County in Pennsylvania 1774-1782 by Oscar Jewell of Wilkes-Barre (delivered before the Lackawanna Historical Society of Scranton May 24, 1921) -- Deals with early Wyoming and the one-time town of Westmoreland, later Westmoreland County.


Memorial of the Fiftieth Anniversary of Lackawanna County October 24, 1928 (compiled and edited by S. Fletcher Weyburn 1927) -- Includes the anniversary program, addresses by invited speakers, and a biography of John Jermyn, to whom the publication is dedicated.

History of a Distinctive Family of Scranton and Lackawanna County, Pennsylvania by S. Fletcher Weyburn, Genealogist -- A record of the Peck Family, particularly of Rev. George Peck, D.D., noted author and celebrated Methodist preacher whose name is forever linked with the early religious developments in Northeastern Pennsylvania including the family line of Deacon William Peck whose descendents settled in Peckville.


The Story of Lackawanna County and Lackawanna Historical Society by S. Fletcher Weyburn (published in the interest of the Lackawanna Historical Society 1928) -- An account of the county's early settlers and formation and of the history of the Lackawanna Historical Society including biographies on its first four presidents.

Early Land Titles of Northeastern Pennsylvania (a paper read February 14, 1922 before the Lackawanna Historical Society by William Alfonzo Wilcox, MA, member of the Society 1925) -- Reviews the Connecticut-Pennsylvania land titles controversy that existed at the turn of the 19th Century.

Three Wise Men of America in Prose and Verse by S. Fletcher Weyburn 1927 revised 1930 -- Tributes in verse to George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, and Theodore Roosevelt.
