## Celebrating a Century

The Catlin House, home of the Lackawanna Historical Society, turns 100 this year. As part of our year-long celebration, here's a look at just a few other places and entities turning 100 in 2012.



Began as a corner drug store in South Scranton in 1912, *Andrew Brown's Drug Store* relocated and expanded its current location two times while growing the products offered to include medical devices and equipment as well as drug prescriptions.

Hoping to give girls the opportunity to grow physically, mentally, and spiritually, Juliette "Daisy" Gordon Low brought together 18 girls in Savannah, Georgia in 1912 for the first *Girl Scout* meeting. More than 50 million girls have participated to date.

In 1912, the District Nursing Association, today known as the *Visiting Nurses Association of Lackawanna County*, was officially chartered. Nurses worked to provide care throughout Scranton to help those in need and to improve health throughout the community. Marking this anniversary is the University of Scranton's Hope Horn Gallery's exhibit "The Visiting Nurses Association of Scranton: One Hundred Years" through May 4.

Arthur Murray Dance Studio, of Coral Gables, Florida, incorporated print advertisements, direct mail, and live radio broadcasts in 1912, to build its current franchise of dance studios nationwide.

The Lackawanna Branch of the Pennsylvania Association for the Blind is also marking its 100th anniversary this year. The group was founded in 1912 and over the years has worked to teach blind individuals how to travel with a cane, established a prevention program, built a creative center, developed and broadcasted a radio show, and offered computer training classes and the services of a Braille printer.

Barbour's Bakery in Carbondale has been familyowned and operated since 1912. Originally on River Street, the store is now on Salem Avenue.



Two brothers founded *Avanti Cigar* in 1912. The company found much success with its the very popular *Parodi* line, and grew to include a selection of flavored cigars. ## Capital Improvements Continue at the Catlin House







## Civil War Author Scheduled to Speak at the Catlin House

There was one last large Confederate army to fight at the end of the Civil War. A peace had been signed at Appomattox Court House. President Lincoln had been assassinated. General William T. Sherman prepared to lead a Union army against Confederate General Joseph E. Johnston. Shortly before the battle would begin, General Sherman sent Private Thomas D. Collins to deliver a dispatch to his front line calling off the impending battle because General Johnston had agreed to surrender terms.

While there would be other small skirmishes, the tale of Private Collins as the last dispatch rider is the focus of Robert F. Harris's second book. Mr. Harris, a former school superintendent in New Jersey and a licensed battlefield guide chose to tell the story of the young boy who joined the Union Army after running away from home at 14.

"He's a kid and does a manly job," Mr. Harris said.

Private Collins would return home within months before re-enrolling in the army. He would go on to win the Congressional Medal of Honor before his 17th birthday. Mr. Harris was drawn to Private Collins' personal history because the Private is originally from the hometown of his wife. A Vietnam veteran with a lifelong interest in history, Mr. Harris said he was familiar with the life story of Private Collins. He saw the opportunity to tell the personal story of Private Collins with an eye toward the experiences and emotions he knew from the battlefield.

Mr. Harris will speak at the Lackawanna Historical Society on April 29 at 2 p.m. about the life of Private Collins and his book. Mr. Harris will also be able to answer questions about Private Collins, the battles, and the experiences during the Civil War.

He will also speak about another book he coauthored, *Dear Sister: The Civil War Letters of the Brothers Gould.* That book is a compilation of letters written by a group of brothers to their sister. The letters were shown to Mr. Harris who wanted to edit and publish them to connect to the themes of his own letters during his time in Vietnam.

The Lackawanna Historical Society has copies of *The Last Dispatch Rider* available for sale in our book store, and they will be available through the Society when Mr. Harris speaks.
